ANITA BRYCE, PHD

Anita K. Bryce, PhD received her undergraduate degree in psychology from Vanderbilt University and her MSW and Ph.D from the University of Pittsburgh. She is a graduate of the Adult and Child Psychoanalytic Training Programs of the Baltimore Washington Psychoanalytic Institute. She has been the Director of a Children's Partial Hospitalization Program, the Fairfax County Adolescent Day Treatment Program and for the last 30+ years she has been in private practice in McLean, Virginia and Washington DC. Dr. Bryce is a teaching analyst and past Director of the Child and Adolescent Training Program at the Washington Baltimore Washington Psychoanalytic Center. She has been recognized as a Distinguished Practitioner in the National Academies of Practice and is the past president of the Baltimore Washington Psychoanalytic Society and the current president of the Washington Baltimore Psychoanalytic Center. Dr. Bryce has been on a number of university faculties throughout the years and has published in the areas and partial hospitalization for children, mental health worker burnout, and mental health law.

JUDITH FINGERT CHUSED, MD

Judith Fingert Chused, MD, is an emeritus training and supervising child, adolescent and adult analyst at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute and a supervising analyst at the Cleveland, Seattle, and St. Louis Psychoanalytic Institutes. She has a private practice of psychiatry and psychoanalysis with children, adolescents and adults in Washington, DC and is a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the George Washington University School of Medicine. She also is a member of the Center for Advanced Psychoanalytic Studies in Princeton, New Jersey and Aspen, Colorado, on the editorial board of the *Psychoanalytic Quarterly*, and reader for *The Journal of the American Psychoanalytic Association*, *Psychiatry*, and *The International Journal of Psychoanalysis*. She is the author of many psychiatric and psychoanalytic articles and has spoken throughout the United States, England, and Europe. A graduate of Wellesley College and Harvard Medical School, she did her psychoanalytic training at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute.

CARLA ELLIOTT-NEELY, PHD

Carla Elliott-Neely, PhD, is a teaching analyst at the Washington Center for Psychoanalysis, trained in child and adult psychoanalysis. She is past President and current Secretary-Elect of the Association for Child Psychoanalysis, Inc. She is a consulting psychoanalyst to Jubilee Jumpstart, a Washington DC daycare and pre-kindergarten program. Her publications include articles on Anna Freud, developmental disharmony, parent loss in childhood, creativity, adolescence, and pre-latency psychopathology as well as books on sublimation and the collected writings of Hansi Kennedy. She is in private practice in Washington, DC.

LUCIE GREENBLUM, MD

Lucie Greenblum, MD, is both an adult and child analyst. She is bilingual and has conducted analyses in both French and English. She has published an article on "empathy and analytic listening." She has given a number of talks at the French International School, most recently on adolescence. She is an assistant clinical professor at Georgetown University Hospital in the department of psychiatry. She was a teaching analyst at the Baltimore Washington Center for Psychoanalysis and is now a teaching analyst at the Washington Center for Psychoanalysis. She was chair of a Study Group on Close Process Attention. She organized and chaired a symposium on "terrorism "after the 9.11 attacks.

MICHAEL JASNOW, PHD

Michael Jasnow, PhD, earned his undergraduate degree in philosophy from Clark University, and his PhD in clinical psychology from The George Washington University. Dr. Jasnow is a graduate of both the adult and child training programs of the Baltimore-Washington Psychoanalytic Institute. For close to 40 years, Dr. Jasnow has worked with children, adolescents and their families. Dr. Jasnow is a teaching analyst at the Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis. In addition to his clinical work, Dr. Jasnow spent approximately 20 years working with research colleagues at the New York State Psychiatric Institute – Columbia University School of Medicine, and the University of Maryland-Baltimore County. Dr. Jasnow's research focused on the development of the capacity for reciprocal social engagement in infancy.

JOY KASSETT, PHD

Joy Kasset, PhD, earned graduate degrees in social work and public health from Columbia University in New York City and her psychology degree from The Catholic University of America in the District of Columbia. In addition to her graduate degrees, she earned certificates in adult, child and adolescent psychoanalysis and has an independent private practice in Northwest Washington. Dr. Kasset is the Chair of the Child and Adolescent Training Program at the Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis(WBCP). She is a teaching analyst at the WBCP and is also on the clinical faculty at The George Washington University, Howard University and Washington School of Psychiatry. Dr. Kasset serves as a Clinical Consultant for St. Ann's Center for Children, Youth and Families in Hyattsville, MD, a residential program for teen mothers and homeless mothers, in transition.

S. KALMAN KOLANSKY, MD, DLFAP

Dr. Kolansky, MD, is a Board Certified Adult and Child Psychiatrist and Graduate in Adult and Child Psychoanalysis from the Baltimore Washington Psychoanalytic Institute. He is an Adult and Child Teaching Analyst in the Washington Baltimore Psychoanalytic Center. He is an Associate Residency Training Director and Chair of Child Psychiatry in the St. Elizabeth's Hospital Psychiatry Residency Training Program. He is an Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the George Washington University School of Medicine. He graduated from Georgetown University School of Medicine. He is in private practice of adult, adolescent and child psychiatry and psychoanalysis in Old Town, Alexandria, Virginia. In his practice, in addition to psychiatric evaluation, psychotherapy and psychoanalysis he does psychiatric consultation, couples therapy, work with parents on adoption and other parenting issues as well as supervision of other mental health professionals. In the past he held positions as Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychiatry in the Georgetown University School of Medicine and Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychology, Center for Professional Psychology, PsyD Program in Clinical Psychology at George Washington University. He has been recipient of many local and national awards for teaching and practice including being named a Distinguished Life Fellow in the American Psychiatric Association, The Irma Bland Teaching Award of the American Psychiatric Association, The Edith Sabshin Teaching Award of the American Psychoanalytic Association, The Vicennial Silver Medal from Georgetown University School of Medicine, Faculty of the Year, Supervisor of the Year and Child Supervisor of the Year awards given by psychiatry residents at St. Elizabeth's Hospital and while in military service was awarded The Meritorious Service Medal for his work while a Major and Psychiatrist in the Army. He has presented many papers and memorial lectures at local, national and international psychoanalytic, psychiatric annual meetings and medical school residency programs on child psychiatric and psychoanalytic treatment and technique as well as issues around developmental impact of adoption, psychoanalysis and cinema etc. His interests include teaching and practice of adult, adolescent and child psychotherapy and psychoanalysis.

BARRY LANDAU, MD

Barry J Landau, MD is a supervising analyst and training analyst emeritus at the Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis. He is also a clinical professor in psychiatry and behavioral sciences at the George Washington University Medical Center and in child health and development (child and adolescent psychiatry) at the Children's Hospital National Medical Center. He is certified in adult, child and adolescent psychiatry by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology. He is also certified in adult, child and adolescent psychoanalysis by the Board on Professional Standards of the American Psychoanalytic Association and is a fellow of the American Board of Psychoanalysis. He has been a consultant at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center and St. Elizabeth's Hospital, although not at the present time. He received the Psychiatrist of the Year Award in 2002 by the Washington Psychiatric Society for his work related to the District of Columbia Mental Health Information Act (DC confidentiality law). He has also received the outstanding volunteer faculty award at Children's Hospital National Medical Center several times and gave the (first) Julia and Thomas Award Lecture also at Children's Hospital. In addition, he received the Edith Sabshin Award for excellence in teaching by the American Psychoanalytic Association. He is currently a member of the DC Ombudsman's Advisory Council and its Clinical Subcommittee. He has written articles related to the subject of confidentiality and ego psychology. He has also written several book reviews in national psychoanalytic journals. He is no longer accepting patients for long-term treatment.

NYDIA LISMAN-PIECZANSKI, M.D.

Nydia Lisman-Pieczanski, MD, is a Child and Adult psychoanalyst, trained at the British Psychoanalytical Institute. She had been trained by Herbert Rosenfeld, Esther Bick, Donald Meltzer, Martha Harris and Ruth Riesemberg-Malcom. Dr. Lisman-Pieczanski spent several years at the Tavistock Clinic. She is a training and supervising analyst of the Buenos Aires Psychoanalytic Association and currently holds memberships in the International Psychoanalytic Association (the I.P.A.), the Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis and was a member of the Washington Center for Psychoanalysis since 1990. She has been teaching at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute and other programs at the Center since 1990. Dr. Lisman-Pieczanski has been leading Infant Observation's seminars at the Washington School of Psychiatry from 1990-94 and for the MPP (Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program at the Washington Center) since 1995- present. She is the Founding Chair of the two year Infant and Young Child Observation Program (Tavistock Model) at the Washington School of Psychiatry. In addition Dr. Lisman-Pieczanski has written on eating disorders in childhood and adolescence; on unilateral termination in psychoanalysis; on projective mechanisms used as a defense against depressive anxieties; on interpretation in psychoanalysis; and also about the analysis with women that were sexually abused in early childhood. At present she is in the process of editing, with her husband Alberto Pieczanski, MD, a book on the "Pioneers of South American Psychoanalysis." Dr. Lisman-Pieczanski has also been a reviewer for the Journal of the American Psychoanalytic Association (JAPA) and the International Journal of Psychoanalysis as well as being a peer reviewer for psychoanalytic books.

JILL M. MILLER, PHD

Jill M. Miller, PhD, is a child, adolescent and adult psychoanalyst in private practice in Washington DC. She did her child and adolescent analytic training at the Anna Freud Centre in London, her PhD at University College London, and her adult analytic training at the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis. Dr. Miller is a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Colorado Medical School, a Training and Supervising Analyst and Faculty member at the Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis, and a Geographic Supervising Analyst for child and adolescent candidates at a number of other Institutes. She has presented and published numerous papers on such topics as the work of Anna Freud, children's development

of insight, analytic work with learning disabled children, the mind of the child analyst, the analyst as a developmental object, and other issues related to child analytic technique, as well as co-editing a book with Dr. Carla Elliott-Neely entitled *The Psychoanalytic Work of Hansi Kennedy: From War Nurseries to the Anna Freud Centre*. Dr. Miller was the President of the Association for Child Psychoanalysis from 2016-2018.

Laurie S. Orgel, MD

Laurie S. Orgel, MD, is an Adult and Child psychiatrist and psychoanalyst. She received her MD from Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis and went to Sheppard and Enoch Pratt Hospital for her adult residency and child fellowship. Her private practice is in Baltimore where she is also on the teaching and supervising faculty at the University of Maryland Medical School.
