Program Description:

The Annual Colloquium is a Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis members only event, in which members who are working on unpublished papers can present in order to gain feedback about the ideas which with they are working. One slot each year is reserved for a candidate to present.

This year the topics include “Moving from Facts to Feelings: Using Sullivan's Detailed Inquiry in Clinical Practice,” “Mothering a Child with a Visible Facial Difference: The Gaze of the Other and the Gaze of the Mother,” and “Remembering Hekate: a Depth-Psychological Exploration of Trauma.” Many practitioners and students of psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy remain insufficiently aware of these issues and may avoid treating these patient groups. Some may undertake to treat them without the necessary special knowledge required. It is necessary and desirable that students and psychoanalytic practitioners become more confident and competent in using these techniques and in treating these patient groups.

Presentation 1:

Brianna Pendleton, PhD, will present “Remembering Hekate: a Depth-Psychological Exploration of Trauma.”

Brianna Pendleton, PhD, Dr. Pendleton is an advanced candidate at WBCP. She has a private practice in Annapolis Maryland. Dr. Pendleton graduated from Pacifica Graduate Institute with a doctorate in Clinical Psychology with an emphasis in Depth Psychology. She earned her Masters from Loyola University in Clinical Pastoral Counseling. Before becoming a psychotherapist, Dr. Pendleton worked for 20 years as a licensed Massage Therapist specializing in Cranio-Sacral Therapy. Previous to her work as a massage therapist, she worked for 7 years as a childbirth educator and doula assisting in labor and delivery at birth centers, at home, and in the hospital. Throughout her professional development, Dr. Pendleton has had an enduring interest in the impact of trauma upon the body, mind, and soul. Of special interest to her is the idea of psyche as soul and psychology as the study of soul and how this idea can further psychoanalytic ideas of the mind, serving a complimentary function similar to complimentary medicine. Lastly, but not the least of her achievements-She is the mother of three adult children.

Sandra Hershberg, MD, present "Mothering a Child with a Visible Facial Difference: The Gaze of the Other and the Gaze of the Mother "

Sandra Hershberg, MD, Dr. Hershberg serves as an Associate Editor of the journals *Psychoanalysis, Self and Context* and is on the Editorial Board of *Psychoanalytic Inquiry*. Most recently, she co-edited and contributed to the book "Psychoanalytic Theory, Research, and Clinical Practice: Reading Joseph D. Lichtenberg," published by Routledge (2016), a volume of *Psychoanalysis, Self and Context*, "In Honor of Anna Ornstein" (2017) and authored "A Female Gaze in/on the Female Body in Art and Psychoanalysis: Paula Modersohn-Becker" (2020). She is editing and contributing to two volumes of *Psychoanalytic Inquiry* currently in press, one on "The Twin Pandemics" and a second on "Home". Her interests include mother/daughter relationships, feminist scholarship in art and psychoanalysis, the relationship between biography and psychoanalysis, and disability studies. Dr. Hershberg has a private practice in Bethesda, MD.

Presentation 3:

Joel Kanter, MSW, LCSW-C, will present "Moving from Facts to Feelings: Using Sullivan's Detailed Inquiry in Clinical Practice."

Joel Kanter, MSW, LCSW-C, is in private practice of clinical social work in Silver Spring, Maryland. A graduate of Smith College School for Social Work, he completed post-graduate training in psychoanalytic psychotherapy at the Washington School of Psychiatry. He serves on the faculty of the Institute for Clinical Social Work and the China American Psychoanalytic Alliance. He is a Consulting Editor of the *Clinical Social Work Journal* and has been recognized as a Distinguished Practitioner by the National Academy of Practice in Social Work. He has authored over 50 articles and book chapters in a diverse array of journals, including *Psychiatric Services*, the *International Review of Psychoanalysis*, the *Bulletin of the Menninger Clinic* and *American Imago*. His seminal article on clinical case management has been cited in over 300 publications in the U.S. and abroad, and his book "Face to Face with Children: The Life and Work of Clare Winnicott" was published by Karnac in 2004.
