Presentation: From the case presentation of a completed psychoanalysis the visiting scholar will lead a lively group discussion of technical approaches to resistance analysis. We will contrast listening analytically using free floating attention with that of Paul Gray's close process monitoring when working with transference of defense in the here and now.

Visiting Scholar: Joan Sacks Lentz, PhD, is a Training and Supervising Analyst at the Minnesota Psychoanalytic Society and Institute. She is a member of the Center for Advanced Psychoanalytic Studies-Princeton and is involved nationally with the American Psychoanalytic Association and locally on committees that deal with candidate selection, progression and supervision. She was a founding member and first President of the local chapter of Division 39 (Psychoanalysis) of the American Psychological Association. Her publications are on the topics of resistance, free association, analysts' difficulties hearing their patients' criticism and clinical applications of left and right brain hemisphere functions. She is in private practice in Minneapolis.

Case Presenter: Suzanne K. Haddad, PsyD, is a recent graduate of The Baltimore Washington Center for Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis training program in adult psychoanalysis. Her private practice, located in the Adams Morgan neighborhood of D.C., includes psychotherapy with children, adolescents and adults as well as adult psychoanalysis. She has also worked with the DC public schools system performing psychological evaluations and brief psychotherapy for students of all ages.
